Third Sunday in Ordinary Time January 23, 2022 Making and Strengthening Disciples of Jesus



Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As you probably know, I enjoy reading and studying my Bible. Even when I am tired and have not finished my preparation for the Tuesday Bible Study, I do not have much trouble being motivated to get it done. But while I am happy to read my Bible, I am not particularly good at other things that I know are also good for me (exercising and good eating, to name just two).

Perhaps one of your struggles is reading the Bible. You know that it is a good thing to do. You have heard people talk about how it has affected their lives. But you just can't seem to bring yourself to open it.

So, what is there to do? How can we get ourselves to do things (like read our Bibles) that we know are good for us?

Perhaps this is a question better answered by a behavioral scientist – someone who specializes in human behavior. I can, I think, offer one helpful suggestion: get a friend to join you.

Allow me an example. I do not like to run. I like finishing a run, but I do not enjoy the act of running. Ride a bicycle for a few hours? Fine. Run for 20 minutes? Augh! Yet I ran nearly every day during my seminary training. Why? I had 3 or 4 friends that met each day to run. The fact that they expected me to show up got me out of my room and downstairs to our meeting spot. Their company and conversation made the runs (almost) enjoyable.

The same may be true when it comes to reading the Bible. If you cannot muster the initiative to read on your own, why not get some help? Would a friend or family member agree to 15 or 30 minutes of Bible time together? Perhaps an organized Bible study would work better. Right now, a dedicated group is reading the book of Acts together on Tuesday mornings (9-10:30am in the Parish Hall). You are welcome to join this group at any time! How can we get ourselves to do things (like read our Bibles) that we know are good for us?

I could go on to add all the reasons reading the Bible would be good for you. I suspect you already know them. Let me conclude with a simple suggestion on getting started – read the Book of Mark. This is one of the four Gospels and, for most people, the easiest to read. Mark tends to tell short stories – one after another – and that makes it move along.

Try this: With your friend (or by yourself) begin with a short prayer asking God to open your heart to His Word and to teach you something. Then read one or two of Mark's stories. Since they are typically no more than a paragraph in length, read them a second time so that you get a clear picture of the story. Then, pause to ask what you can learn from the story. What might God be saying to you? Your reflection may transition into prayer and that's a great way to end your time.

No, that method will not make you a Bible scholar. It will get you started and, hopefully, begin to create in you a love of scripture. If I can ever be of help, let me know. And, speaking of help, on page 4 of this bulletin we've included the first part of an overview of the Old Testament. Why not cut it out when you get home and put it with your Bible?

May you be blessed by the reading of God's Word!

About the Bible: An overview (part 1)

We celebrate the Bible today but for many, it is a hard book to read. One thing that can help is having an overview – the big picture. Here is the first part of an overview of the Old Testament. Why not cut it out and put it with your Bible. It may help you as you read.

The timeline of Old Testament history

- From Abraham to David
- From David to the Babylonian Exile
- From the Babylonian Exile to the Messiah

From Abraham to David

Era of the Patriarchs (1850-1550)

- Key persons: Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph
- Key events: Call of Abraham and migration to Canaan; earliest traditions of God revealing himself to the patriarchs; settlement of tribes in northern Egypt following Joseph's rise to power
- Found in the book of Genesis

Egyptian Era – Redemption and Covenant (1550-1230)

- Key persons: Joseph (ca.1550)
- Key events: Expansion of Egyptian power under Thutmose III (1479-1425) and Rameses II (1279-1213).
- Regional Superpower: Egypt (noteworthy rulers: Thutmose III, Rameses II)
- Found in the book of Genesis

Exodus and Wilderness Period (1270-1230)

- Key persons: Moses, Aaron, Miriam, Pharaoh Rameses II
- Key events: Call of Moses; confrontation between Moses and Pharaoh; celebration of Passover; flight from Egypt; covenant at Mount Sinai and giving of the law
- Found in Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy

Israelite Invasion and Settlement of Canaan -Inheritance (1230-1020)

- Key persons: Joshua, the Judges (Othniel, Ehud, Shamgar, Deborah, Gideon, Tola, Jair, Jephthah, Ibzan, Elon, Abdon, Samson), Samuel
- Key events: First settlements in the land of Canaan under Joshua; dispersion of the twelve tribes throughout Canaan and formation of a confederacy under the Judges
- Regional Superpower: Egypt (noteworthy ruler: Rameses III)
- Found in Joshua, Judges, and 1 Samuel

In the second phase of the world-wide Synod called by Pope Francis, we are offering opportunities for small groups to meet, reflect, and share. The sessions will begin with prayer and a short exercise where you will be guided to think back on your spiritual journey and how Sacred Heart has been a part of it. Following that, you'll have an opportunity to share your thoughts on these Synod questions:

- 1. Who is journeying with you in your spiritual Life. Who doesn't have this accompaniment? Who appears to you to be alone on the journey?
- 2. Do you feel heard or listened to in the Church? What enables or hinders you in speaking up?
- 3. How is the Holy Spirit working through our parish to draw people to Christ? What opportunities have we missed?
- 4. How have your experiences with Catholics different from you in opinion, spirituality, or lifestyle aided you in your faith or challenged you in your faith?
- 5. How is the Holy Spirit drawing us all closer together in communion, participation, and mission? Where is the Holy Spirit leading the Church?

Preparing for Next Week



In our Gospel we read that once Jesus' listeners hear that his message entails that their status as Israelites is not a determining factor in God's love, they unite in an effort to run Jesus off a cliff. The message of Jesus did not fit the Israelites agenda or narrative.

It was difficult for the Israelites to accept that their God, i.e., the God of Israel, also loves those who do not even acknowledge Him. Their mindset is, we are not them, we are Israelites and the one true God is the Israeli God. They believed that those who did not fit the ethnicity of "Israelite" were excluded from God's love and promises.

Eventually, as we know from Scripture, Christianity was universalized. No matter what your ethnicity or background, you could be a Christian and you were loved by God.

Is this idea of God's universal love accepted today? Do people unconsciously respond the same way that the Israelites did in our Gospel? That is, do people unknowingly and metaphorically run Jesus off a cliff?

If we turn on the news we will likely see hostility between political parties and debate about the vaccine. We see the Israelite mindset, "it is us against them" and "they are wrong or bad and we are right and good."

Is this what God would want? When we face challenges like a pandemic do we divide instead of unite as one human family that is created in the image and likeness of God?

The Israelites did not like the idea that "their" God, loves everyone. What about you?
