Some Food for Thought

A friend once defined wealth as the ability to do the things you want to do and the ability to not do the things you don't want to do. I always found the second part particularly insightful. We tend to think of wealth only in terms of what it can get us but resources can be employed in this other way to great effect. For example, one doesn't have to be particularly well off to own a recreational boat and a swimming pool, but wealth allows for someone else to take care of these things likely adding to their enjoyment. Put another way, wealth allows for a greater number of choices. A wealthy person can choose to take care of the lawn or pay someone else to do it. A poorer person may only have the option of doing it themselves even if it is a disliked task.

A few years ago, I read several articles on the Church's call to minister to and with the poor. One, "A Vow of Poverty" by Sandra M. Schneider, IHM included a small part about choices. "The real differences between the truly poor and people who choose a poor lifestyle is precisely that the latter choose it, and they can unchoose it if things become too difficult. Even if they never do, the fact that they can assuages the violent determinism that constitutes real poverty."* Poverty then can be defined as a situation in which there are few, if any, options.

This seems to me to be a better definition than some dollar amount no matter how well calculated. An impoverished person is simply one who is stuck. They lack the means – money, resources, or power – to effect any change in their situation. This is especially helpful when we bring our "American Dream / Work Ethic" to bear on the poor. Do we not almost instinctively think that they are poor due to lack of effort or as the result of prior choices? Clearly, all they need to do is begin working hard and all will be well!

In point of fact, no hard work can improve a situation that lacks options. How many homeless people really choose each day to forgo getting a job? Are not many – if not most – unable to hold a normal job? Or what single mother working a minimum wage job has the option to live other than paycheck to paycheck and so perpetually be just one major expense from disaster?

More broadly, if poverty is thought of in terms of available choices, then it is possible to see how someone with money may, in fact, be impoverished. Take, for example, a person caught up in an addiction. They effectively don't have a real option to forgo the next drink or high and so they are in poverty or, as the Bible terms it, in slavery – though clearly slavery is a situation without options.

Thinking in terms of options can also give us a way to feel some solidarity with the poor. I've been fortunate over the years to have had many options, even when my income fell well below the poverty line. But as Sr. Schneider observes in her article there are times when I do lack options. "We cannot lengthen our day and if someone consumes time we had allotted for other purposes there is no reclaiming it. We cannot do anything about weather that keeps us from getting where we need to go. We cannot keep from getting the flu and losing a week of work at a critical juncture in an important project... When our options evaporate we experience solidarity with the poor... the real solidarity of fellow-sufferers in a world we do not control and cannot change."

I suspect there's a lot more in this concept of seeing poverty as a lack of choice. Perhaps you'll give this some though.

We are particularly grateful to **Angry Pepper Waterside Smokeshack and Grill and our parishioners Nick and Jamie Wille** who provided the meat, rolls and coleslaw.



Last Saturday

When first constructed, the school classroom doors opened to the outside and a planter area allowed for some lovely flowers and landscaping. When the two buildings were roofed together, those planters lost their usefulness and looked a bit odd. We decided this summer to pour cement into these areas to make a wider, more useful hallway space. The contractor offered us an excellent price for the cement but asked an additional \$4,000 to remove the mulch and dirt.

We are beyond-words-thankful for **fourteen wonderful, hardworking, volunteers** who showed up Saturday morning to save us this extra expense. And they did more than just dig and remove the dirt. Check out these examples of good stewardship!

- The dirt allowed us to add more fill to the picnic area to prevent the pooling of water during heavy rains.
- The mulch was collected separately and will be reused around the church property.
- Most of the planters at one time had been filled with "river rock." The group was able to separate much of this rock from the dirt and we'll be able to reuse them as well. (They pulled several hundred dollars' worth of rock from that dirt!)
- The group re-mulched a bed and filled in a dirt walkway on the east side of the church.
- And, we saved the \$4,000!

Not bad for 4 hours of work!

Brothers and sisters: let us ask ourselves: do we bear within our hearts this liberating image of God, the God of closeness, compassion and tenderness, or do we think of him as a merciless judge, an accountant who keeps a record of every moment of our lives? Is ours a faith that generates hope and joy, or, among us, a faith still weighed down by fear, a fearful faith? What is the face of God that we proclaim in the Church? The Saviour who liberates and heals, or the Terrifying God who burdens us with feelings of guilt? In order to convert us to the true God, Jesus shows us where to start: from his word. That word, by telling us the story of God's love for us, liberates us from the fears and preconceptions about him that stifle the joy of faith. That word overthrows false idols, unmasks our projections, destroys our all too human images of God and brings us back to see his true face, his mercy. The word of God nurtures and renews faith: let us put it back at the centre of our prayer and our spiritual life! Let us put at the centre the word that reveals to us what God is like. The word that draws us close to God.
