The following is an except from an article by Matt Malone, S.J. found in the introduction to the September edition of American Magazine. I found it wonderfully insightful (and well written) and thought it worth sharing with you this week. Fr. Kevin

Many of you probably know the story of St. Ignatius Loyola - how an ambitious, vainglorious young man in the service of the king found himself in 1521 leading the defense of Pamplona against the most powerful army in Europe; how he refused to surrender in the face of the most desperate odds; how a cannonball shattered his leg as his army collapsed. You may have heard about how Ignatius was carried back to Loyola-for two excruciating weeks over mountainous terrain-to his ancestral home, where, while recovering from his wounds, he had a "conversion" experience while reading the Life of Christ and the Book of the Saints.

You can visit the room where it happened-it is called the Chapel of the Conversion. Except that name is a misnomer. True, Ignatius' conversion began there, but it did not end there. Other Christians may describe their conversion experiences as having occurred at a specific moment. They may even pinpoint the exact date and time. But Catholics don't generally think about it that way. For most of us conversion is a process, a series of moments, of advance and setback, and the process lasts a lifetime. That was certainly true for Ignatius. He

had resolved in his sickbed to serve his earthly king no more, but rather, to follow the King of Kings. So he set out to rival the greatest saints through extreme feats of prayer and fasting – and nearly killed himself in the process. Ignatius was sincere in his desire to become a new man when he left Loyola, but he was still pretty much what he had always been - willful and ego-driven.

It was not until he reached Manresa, a small town on the River Cardoner - where he was so distraught from the lack of progress in his new life that he even contemplated suicide - that he finally gave up his will to a higher power. At the banks of the Cardoner, he told God, in effect: "I give up. I have done all I can. I have tried everything. I'm handing it over to you "to do with it what you will." And that's the moment things really started to change. In the days that followed, Ignatius' eyes were opened to mystical visions of God and creation that would nourish and inspire him for the rest of his life. At Pamplona, he had refused to surrender and lost the battle. At Manresa, he surrendered at last and won the war.

There is a big lesson in that: We are not in ultimate control of our faith journeys, any more than we control our ultimate destinies. It's true that we have to put in the time and effort - God can do little for us if we are unwilling to cooperate. But Christianity is not a self-help group; it's a God-help group. As long as Ignatius continued to act out of his grandiosity – out of the belief that he was the origin and destination of everything - then it didn't matter which king he served. Yet when he finally began to act out of gratitude - out of the acknowledgement that God is the origin and destination of everything - then all things became possible. Indeed, things came to be that Ignatius could never have imagined - like a worldwide company of men and their lay colleagues laboring today to advance the kingdom of God on nearly every continent and in every conceivable kind of good work.

Question: Is there any of the "old" in me? Am I truly, as St. Paul put it, "a new creature in Christ?"

Participation

I've been interested in a series of emails from our diocese that have discussed "participation." They have pointed out that in an average diocese about 20% of those registered support the diocesan appeal. Sacred Heart's participate rate in the appeal is 23% - a bit better than that average - and 42.5% of our parishioners have made a gift to the parish in 2022. That's wonderful!

It is easy for me to understand those that contribute to the parish and the appeal. They have the ability to give, can see the good that their gift will do, and take the time to go online, write a check, or use an envelope. But I have been wondering about the others. Some, undoubtedly, are unable to give. Some may be upset by something their bishop or pastor said or did. While I'm not sure that's a great reason to withhold support for local and diocesan ministries, at least it is understandable. What about the rest? What prevents so many from giving, even a small donation?

I wonder if they simply haven't taken the time to give. In other words, these people have the ability to give and see the value of the ministries they will support but never get around to doing it. If that happens to describe you, will you accept some encouragement?

Giving, whether to the appeal, the parish, or another charity you value, is important. It matters to the ministry and, most importantly, it matters to your discipleship. Make the time to decide how you will support our parish and / or the appeal. You can easily give online by setting up a recurring weekly or monthly gift so that it doesn't have to be a burden to your time.

Imagine what the parish and our diocese could do if those participation percentages were higher.

The National Eucharistic Revival: For your reflection



The National Eucharistic Revival is a 3-year effort to increase understanding and devotion to our Lord's presence in the Eucharist. While the parish-level phase will begin next year, each of us can begin this journey of discernment and encounter through personal reflection. This series of articles is one way to do that.

Can I have some help, please? (Part 2)

Last week I mentioned an article by someone who summarized his struggles with the Eucharist this way: "Can we stop talking about the Eucharist as though it is simple to understand and easy to accept?"

This is, I think, a cry from the heart of someone who wants to believe and yet struggles. In other words, they are not rejecting our belief, they simply haven't yet come to a place where they can fully embrace it.

I wonder if this is why the Pew Research Center survey asking Catholics about their belief in the True Presence revealed that only a small percentage (about a third) believe in the Eucharist as truly being the Body and Blood of Jesus. Put yourself in the shoes of someone who attends Mass every week but struggles with that belief. You are asked a yes or no question. You have some faith. You probably sense that Eucharist is important in some way, and yet you can't quite say you believe. What do you do? You respond, "No" to the question which makes you look like an unbeliever in the results.

We need to find ways to help these people move forward in their faith. Perhaps they need just one step to come to belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. One way we might help is sharing. Can those of us who see Jesus in the sacrament share our experiences - a story perhaps – of how God has touched us in and through the Eucharist? I have seen decidedly unbelieving teens transformed by times of adoration. No one gave them a theology lesson. The experience of the other teens around them provided everything they needed. Experience – our own and that of others – can be far more powerful than words.

Rather than lament the results of a survey question. Let's share our stories and help others to grow in their faith.

Pope Francis on the Death Penalty



"Each day, there is a growing "NO" to the death penalty around the world. For the Church this is a sign of hope. From a legal point of view, it is not necessary. Society can effectively repress crime without definitively depriving offenders of the opportunity to redeem themselves. Always, in every legal sentence, there must be a window of hope. Capital punishment offers no justice to victims, but rather encourages revenge and it prevents any possibility of undoing a possible miscarriage of justice. Additionally, the death penalty is morally inadmissible, for it destroys the most important gift we have received: life. Let us not forget that, up to the very last moment, a person can convert and change and in the light of the Gospel, the death penalty is unacceptable. The commandment, "Thou shalt not kill," refers to both the innocent and the guilty. I, therefore, call on all people of goodwill to mobilize for the abolition of the death penalty throughout the world. Let us pray that the death penalty, which attacks the dignity of the human person, may be legally abolished in every country."

Pope Francis on John Paul I

Recently, Pope Francis beatified one of his predecessors, John Paul I, a briefly serving pontiff who distinguished himself with his humility and cheerfulness. The ceremony in St. Peter's Square is the last step before sainthood for Albino Luciani, an Italian who died 33 days after being elected pontiff.

"With a smile, Pope John Paul managed to communicate the goodness of the Lord," Francis said in his homily where he praised the mild-tempered and humble pastor. "How beautiful is a church with a happy, serene and smiling face, that never closes doors, never hardens hearts, never complains or harbors resentments, isn't angry, does not look dour or suffer nostalgia for the past."


