Sacred Heart Catholic Church Sixth Sunday of Easter May 14, 2023 Making and Strengthening Disciples of Jesus



Sisters and brothers in Christ,

Each week we hear the priest say, "Lord Jesus Christ, you said to your Apostles: "Peace I leave you, my peace I give you." In fact, the word "peace" occurs often during Mass. Have you considered what that means for our daily lives? What is this peace that Christ offers us?

It might help to look at the next part of the verse where this line originates. John 14:27a reads, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you." The peace we can get from God is not, it seems, like the peace we get from the world, so let's look at the world's peace.

To a large extent, that peace depends on circumstances. If things are going well in my life, then I'm at peace. If something goes wrong, then my peace disappears. How many of us have had a good day ruined by bad customer service? We might be at peace until we watch the news and then find we are angry when it ends. A broken relationship, financial difficulties, traffic, a poor night's sleep, and so much more can rob us of our peace, and our society's solution is to improve the circumstances. Buy this. Read that. Improve yourself, your home, your kids. How many ads and books have promised us that peace is waiting for us once we purchase some product.

Jesus, however, offers us peace that does not depend on the circumstances. You see this in the beatitudes. Blessed (happy) are the poor, those who mourn, those who are persecuted. Jesus seems to think you and I can be happy – that we can have peace – even when things do not go our way.

How do we get to the place where our peace is not disrupted by our circumstances. I suspect this is a lifetime journey, but I can suggest two things that might get us started.

First, remember that many things are completely outside our control. The vast majority of the news falls into that category and if I understand my limitations then I can more easily handle the bad news I hear.

Second, it is helpful to remember that God is in control. Our Bible study group learned this from the book of Esther. God used flawed human beings and unbelievers to accomplish his purposes. That is still true today.

Let's close with an example. The most recent shooting at an outlet mall in Texas may have robbed you or your peace, or perhaps the statements of various politicians about that shooting troubled you. As I followed this story, I remembered that all of it was outside of my control. I don't get to pass laws about gun ownership in Texas. I'm not in charge of mental health availability. From a worldly point of view, I have no control at all.

What I do have is my faith and what does my faith teach me to do? First, I won't worry about things outside of my control and second, I can pray for the victims, their families, and, as instructed by Jesus, for the repose of the soul of the gunman. I can pray for an end to violence of all types. I can thank God that he's in control, even when it doesn't appear that way to me. Doing what Jesus teaches is what will lead me to the peace of Christ.

I'll never get the peace I desire from our society. It will only come from being a disciple of Christ.

Online Giving - Give it a try!

A few times each year, we remind our parishioners of the option to give electronically rather than using envelopes or dropping loose cash in the basket. Right now, about 100 parishioners give this way and it makes up about a third of our weekly offering.

I know the electronic giving may sound intimidating to some. I recall helping my mother set up her electric bill to be paid automatically from her checkbook. She wasn't sure about letting someone have access to her account, but a few months later, after experiencing the convenience of the arrangement, she insisted I sign her up for any other bill that would accept electronic payments!

Online giving is also a terrific way to be a good steward of your money. It forces you to decide how much you are called to give, and it provides a simple way of making that happen. Go to sacredheartpinellaspark.com and click on the "giving" icon in the upper right-hand corner of the screen. You'll be taken to the main page of our online processing vendor (Our Sunday Visitor). Most find the page easy to navigate. You choose the amount, the frequency (weekly or monthly), and can change it later if your circumstances change.





A Message from Pope Francis

This is an excerpt from Pope Francis' Wednesday, December 30, 2020, General Audience, where he continues his discussion of evangelization. You can read the entire talk at vatican.va. Click on Audiences, 2020, and choose the one for Dec. 30th.

For us Christians, thanksgiving was the name given to the most essential Sacrament there is: the Eucharist. In fact, the Greek word means precisely this: thanksgiving . Eucharist: thanksgiving. Christians, as all believers, bless God for the gift of life. To live is above all to have received life. All of us are born because someone wanted us to have life. And this is only the first of a long series of debts that we incur by living. Debts of gratitude. During our lives, more than one person has gazed on us with pure eyes, gratuitously. Often, these people are educators, catechists, persons who carried out their roles above and beyond what was required of them. And they stirred gratitude within us. Even friendship is a gift for which we should always be grateful.

This "thank you" that we must say continually, this thanks that Christians share with everyone, grows in the encounter with Jesus. The Gospels attest that when Jesus passed by, he often stirred joy and praise to God in those who met Him. The Gospel accounts of Christmas are filled with prayerful people whose hearts are greatly moved by the coming of the Saviour. And we too were called to participate in this immense jubilation. The episode of the ten lepers who are healed also suggests this. Naturally, they were all happy about having recovered their health, thus being allowed to end that unending forced quarantine that excluded them from the community. But among them, there was one who experienced an additional joy: in addition to being healed, he rejoices at the encounter with Jesus. He is not only freed from evil, but he now possesses the certainty of being loved. This is the crux: when you thank someone, you express the certainty that you are loved. And this is a huge step: to have the certainty that you are loved. It is the discovery of love as the force that governs the world. Dante would say: the Love that "moves the sun and other stars" (Paradise, XXIII, 145). We are no longer vagabonds wandering aimlessly here and there, no: we have a home, we dwell in Christ, and from that "dwelling" we contemplate the rest of the world which appears infinitely more beautiful to us. We are children of love, we are brothers and sisters of love. We are men and women of grace.
